We live in a time of religious warfare, not just between different religions, but also between those with differing versions of the same faith. The path to spiritual maturity comes by restoring the role of religion, a form of spirituality discovered not by addition, but by a process of subtraction. Habit has long preoccupied a wide range of theologians, philosophers, sociologists, psychologists, and neuroscientists.
