The Southern Christian Advocate was the publication of the Methodist Confrence of both South and North Carolina, Georgia and Florida for the period 1837-1878. It also covered other states as well, such as: Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama and occasionally containing notices from other states as well. Vol. #1 contains the names of approximately 70,000 individuals and Vol. #2 which covers the Civil War period, contains the names of approximately 30,000 individuals. The marriage notices will often times have "son of" "daughter of" etc.. This is very important source for information when doing Methodist ancestry. Considering that the State of South Carolina did not officially start keeping vital records until 1911, these notices take on an added importance. North Carlina requirment for marriage licenses (as opposed to bonds) did not come into effect until 1868. And some Georgia counties have lost their marriage records. Considering the time frame of these books makes these marriage notices important because many times couples will move away from where they were married and finding a marriage record can be very difficult to locate if the county and state of the marriage are not already known. The death notices within these books are mini-biographies of the deceased persons, often times giving places of birth and former residences. During the Civil War years, many persons could not afford tombstones or erected only wooden markers which have not survived and hence these books become even more impotant to the reacher.

Due to South Carolina not officially keeping vital records until 1911, makes researching in old newspapers extremely important. Many times these may be the only remaining record of its type. These notices are from all over South Carolina, but particularly from the counties of Edgefield, Kershaw, Lexington, Newberry, Orangeburg and Richland.

Somewhat concurrent with but mostly supplemental to Salley's Marriage Notices in the South-Carolina Gazette above, the marriages in this book give the name of the bride and groom, the exact date of the marriage, names of parents, place of residence, and sometimes the occupation of the groom, and refer to 1,200 persons in all.

Since South Carolina did not officially keep Vital Records until 1911 makes researching within old newspapers extremely important. These marriage and death notices have been abstracted from The Laurensville Herald, Spartanburg Express, The Spartan, the Conservatist (Newberry), The Newberry Sentinel, The Rising Sun (Newberry) and The Lexington Flag, Temperance Standard and Lexington Telegraph. These are the only newspapers that could be located from the Districts of Spartanburg, Laurens, Newberry, and Lexington, South Carolina, for the years prior to 1866.

MARRIAGE NOTICES IN THE SOUTH-

The Associate Reformed Presbyterians of the South sponsored two periodicals before the Civil War. Although endorsed by the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, both were published by individual ministers without any financial support from the synod. The Christian Magazine of the South and The Erskine Miscellany (later The Due West Telescope) regularly carried death and marriages notices until their respective terminations. Death notices generally include the name of the deceased, date of death, location at death, name(s) of parent(s), and name of spouse; many death notices also include additional information such as cause of death and/or biographical tidbits. Marriage notices generally include the date and location of marriage, the name of the official, the names of the bride and groom; marriage notices may also include additional information such as the names of the bride's parents. Some stories are included, which have special human interest and others, which were clearly intended as a warning of how sudden and uncertain death may be. Marriage Notices in The South Carolina and American General Gazette and the Royal Gazette his volume contains marriage and death notices from the three Baptist newspapers which were published in South Carolina following the Civil War: The South Carolina Baptist (1866-1868)

published at Anderson, The Working Christian (1869-1878) published first in Yorkville and later (beginning 19 May 1870) in Charleston, and The Baptist Courier (1878-1887). The notices are from all over South Carolina; however, the lion's share concern the Barnwell County area. In the difficult post-war years many people could not afford to erect tombstones or erected only wooden stones, which have long since weathered away. For some of those interred, an obituary notice may be the only record of their death. Marriage notices are especially important in South Carolina, where there was no state-wide marriage license law until 1 July 1911. A full-name index, prepared by James D.
