While there are many strategies for improving the educational process, we need a way to find out what works and what doesn't work as well. Educational assessment seeks to

determine just how well students are learning and is an integral part of our quest for improved education. The nation is pinning greater expectations on educational assessment than ever before. We look to these assessment tools when documenting whether students and institutions are truly meeting education goals.
